## GRACE: AMAZING GRACE

Grace Johnson and her daughter Chanel moved into Walnut Hill 32 years ago, and became rehab partners. When Chanel was only 16, they lined the living room wall with mirrors (after stripping layers of wallpaper) and replaced the drop ceiling.

When RTP came to Walnut Hill via the Enterprise Center CDC, Grace was involved since she is co-captain of the block. At the same time, she was skeptical, "It can't be for real." Having done work in her house for years, she knew what it takes to do home repairs.

Five homeowners were accepted in the fall of 2009 for the initial Block Build. After seeing the promises come to fruition—"It made me a believer"—Grace started to spread the word in earnest. As a result, 22 homeowners were in the spring Block Build and RTP has become integral to Grace's community advocacy. In her role as Financial Secretary of the Walnut Hill Association, Grace is delighted that these resources came to her neighborhood, "especially for seniors who have to live on a fixed income."

## WHO: WOMEN HELPING OTHERS

Cindy Hunter, BeautiControl Director, represented the WHO (Women Helping Others) Foundation in the presentation of a \$20,000 grant to RTP at the Walnut Hill Block Build. This was her introduction to RTP, and her report to Cindy Turek, WHO Foundation executive director, illustrates how impressed she was with RTP's mission and work.

"What an awesome experience! There were six of us, including a child of a colleague (quite an eye opening experience for this 10 year old)! It was exciting to give WHO money locally. I cannot wait to share my experience with the rest of the team. You made the right choice in awarding money to this amazing group. We met volunteer teams and toured some of the homes that were being worked on. You would not believe the condition of some of these homes. We went into one where, had we not

been told people were living there, we would have thought it was abandoned. They had even been living without a kitchen, which was being worked on that day!!! I can hardly even write without being in tears, and I know everyone else felt the same way. It makes me thankful for what I have and realize what is just 45 minutes from my home. What is really exciting is that for every dollar given, they get \$5.00 worth of repairs so our \$20,000 is times five, but they need so much more than that!!"

# POPULAR MECHANICS: GO GREEN, GARFIELD STREET

*On the way back to New York, Mike Kresch Executive Director Integrated Marketing at Popular Mechanics reflected on the day, "It's one thing to talk about and plan a project behind the scenes; to actually participate and really be a part of it is amazing and truly rewarding. It was a fantastic day. I wouldn't change a thing about it!"*

"Go Green Garfield" was the chant of 55 volunteers on June 5 as they helped 22 homeowners on E. Garfield Street in the Wister section of Germantown. Sponsored by Popular Mechanics, this Block Build is saving people money and saving the planet for the next generation. Three stand-out projects augmented the A to Z energy efficient upgrades for homeowners. Perhaps this will inspire projects in your home?

## Community Garden

RTP helped the neighborhood get permission to clear out a vacant lot to install a community garden. Designed by Matthew Brener, the garden took shape thanks to the energies of Popular Mechanics' employees. They came down from New York City in full force, ready to work. A block captain will lead monitoring and managing the garden once it's installed.

## Flow-through Planter

The Philadelphia Water Department built a prototype flow-through planter, and was eager to have a host to put one into action. Flow-through planters reduce storm water flow rates, volume and temperature, and improve water quality. They are designed so that they don't infiltrate the ground. Sundrops, pink muhly grass, smooth blue asters, alpine violets, and prairie dropseed are now blooming in front of Earl Tribble's house on Garfield Street.

## Solar Hot Water Heater

Justin Seweryn's experience with solar energy in India made him a natural to work alongside Brian Duncan of Arvak Energy Solutions to install a solar hot

water heater at Mamie Pugh's house. Justin explains the benefits, "We selected Mrs. Pugh to be the recipient of the solar hot water heater because she has grandchildren living in her house; she'll get more bang for the buck than a person living alone. A lot of home energy use goes to heating hot water. A solar hot water heater generates 20-40% energy savings because it uses electricity only as a back up."

Justin continues, "The educational component to this project is key. The oil spill in the gulf is evidence of the importance of renewable energy. It reduces the dollars spent on energy and the impact on the environment. Everyone can play a role."

# SEARS: HEROES AT HOME, COMING HOME

Homeowner Diane Hawkins was at the center of a major Sears-sponsored project. To her it's both thrilling and daunting. "I'm overwhelmed. It's a godsend." To Sears, her story was so inspiring that it increased its sponsorship through its *Heroes at Home* initiative that supports home repairs and other projects for returning veterans.

Diane's story starts with her son David's birth. "He was born here, literally. On the step. We couldn't make it to the hospital. He went into the service when he was 17. I had to sign for him. It was July 2001. After 9/11, I wanted my signature back! He was so young it was difficult at first. He kept asking for candy, missing the taste of home. So, I put Tastykakes in his care packages. Oh, and he went nuts over the Cow Tales."

David has since travelled the globe and served four tours in Iraq. He's coming to the States in July with his wife (who he met in Germany) and two children; eventually he'll be home literally and figuratively, joining Diane and his sister. The house has been through a lot since Diane grew up there. Her father was handy; Diane has neither the skills nor the financial resources for the level of maintenance and repairs this old house needs.

Becky's Beauties is the volunteer team who did Phase I, working several weekends. This included ceiling repairs

(after RTP repaired the roof), flooring, plumbing, and electrical repairs. All three bathrooms were renovated by the Stock Group. A back room was rebuilt, and the dilapidated porch that was a hazard, especially with young children living in the house, was removed.

Sears stepped in for Phase II, adding to their sponsorship dollars. Sears has provided EnergyStar appliances, making Diane the envy of the block. (We're not positive, but some may be helping extra in exchange for laundry rights!) Two dozen Sears' employees came on June 30 to prep and paint the entire house, and to do the finishing touches. Mark Martin, Manager of the only Sears store in the City of Philadelphia (Cottman Avenue) is proud of the role they play. "Regionally, we've raised more for the cause than anybody else. Locally, through the register donations and bake sales, Hawaiian Day, jeans day, etc. we all really get behind this."

Carmen Gonzalez, self-professed expert at getting other employees to donate, says "It's nice to see where the dollars go. You see that it really matters." Edna Morales chimes in, "This day is a great experience. I think it's important to do something for someone else. I want my kids to learn this."

At the end of the day, the volunteers looked pleased with the work they had done to help Diane's family and others. They should have. Thank you Sears!

Since 50% of its law practice is on real estate issues, Linebarger Goggan Blair & Sampson, LLP's house sponsorship of RTP was a natural. Moreover, attorney Sharon Humble related the series of events that brought the firm's support to fruition: "I saw in the Philadelphia Legal Intelligencer that Peter Hardy had joined the RTP Board, and his firm and mine are in the same building. I'm active in CREW (Commercial Real Estate Women) and found that other members volunteer with RTP. I was in City Council waiting for an ordinance and heard RTP getting a proclamation for its work. Having all of these signals was an omen. After my own vetting process, I felt very comfortable pitching RTP to the management committee at the firm."

Today, the employee corkboard is full of photographs of the firm's experiences during the Walnut Hill Block Build. Sharon reported, "Everyone had a great time. We had a variety of skills to offer. A group of guys were taught how to hang dry wall from a skilled volunteer and jumped right in to do a massive amount of work. Others focused on clean up,

painting, and restoring the street. It was great that you didn't necessarily have to have a skill to be noticeably and immediately effective. I also was impressed by the efficiency of RTP as well as the sense of camaraderie within the entire block. The neighbors' enthusiasm and desire to make their community better was contagious."

Two weeks later, Sharon and a colleague ran into Dana Dabney, the homeowner the group had helped, in a SEPTA concourse, and were greeted with hugs. Sharon wonders how many times they had passed each other in the concourse in the past and hadn't realized.

## WACHOVIA: MAKING AN INVESTMENT IN COMMUNITIES

Barbara Nate, Corporate Communications, and Michael DelBene, Community Affairs, of Wachovia, a Wells Fargo Company teamed up to explain why their company is a Community Sponsor of RTP. OTs (Occupational Therapists) are integral to RTP's volunteer teams. After initial assessments, she and Jean ("I couldn't have done all this without her") ordered equipment, problem-solved with the homeowners and volunteers, and ensured the modifications would help the homeowners age safely and independently in place.

## BNY MELLON: SUPPORTING THE RT AFFILIATE NETWORK

"We liked the 'cut of your jib'" was Frank Hammond's explanation of why his company first got involved with Rebuilding Together. Frank Hammond is a CRA Officer at BNY Mellon, a Community Sponsor of RTP this year. He elaborates, "As a corporate citizen, BNY Mellon wants to invest in communities where our employees work and live. Targeting vulnerable areas, our dollars support projects focused on housing, workforce development, and basic human services. We make our donations where we feel it will have the greatest impact. Rebuilding Together enters

the picture at a critical time for the older population, many of whom have been independent for many years, but are facing distressing situations in their homes."

Frank immediately got involved in more projects first overseeing "pots and dumps" (RT Pittsburgh slang for port-a-

potties and dumpsters). He has been captivated with RT ever since, using his other skills to search for a new Executive Director, recruit Board members, and solicit sponsors.

Lucky for RT Philadelphia! Our relationship with Frank, built at national and regional conferences, is a prime example of the RT affiliate network in action. Frank has facilitated funding for RTs across the region: Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, Harrisburg, Montgomery County Maryland, and New York City.
